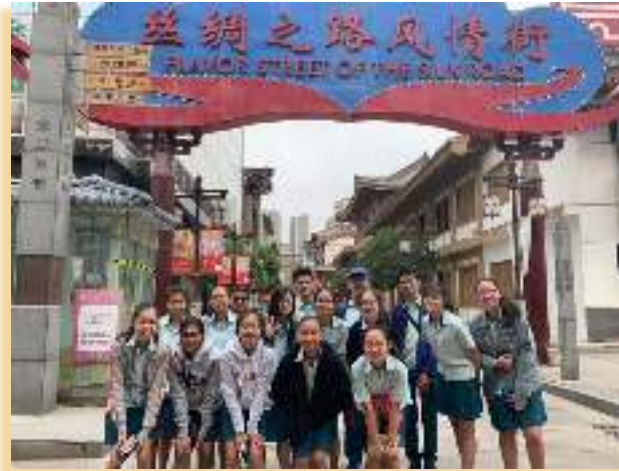

Students who are keen in art and interested in building self-efficacy participated in TAP which ran for eight weeks starting on 3rd July 2019. 20 students learnt various art forms including ink dye on ceramic plates, mixed media art on canvas, paper cutting lamp shade, weaving and photography. Through this programme, participants learnt about perseverance, understood what constituted a positive outlook and reframed their thoughts, developed self and social awareness and practised resilience and cultivated skills to make better choices in life. Students enjoyed the art lessons as they not only learnt about the different art forms but also life lessons and life promoting values. These include having the perseverance to complete their weaving and paper cutting lamp shade and working in teams for the group projects.
