- bond with the peers through pro-social and team-building activities; and
- appreciate our History as they complete challenges in the City Hall area.



Whilst in school, the students learnt more about the Five Practices of the Student Leadership Challenge by Kouzes & Posner:

- Model The Way
- Inspire a Shared Vision
- Challenge the process
- Enable others to act
- Encourage the Heart

Through lots of experiential learning and team-building activities, the students learnt more about themselves, their peers and Singapore as well as develop the necessary self-leadership skills that will help them adapt and thrive in their secondary school life.





Students had fun playing the team building games such as All Aboard, Turn Over a New Leaf and Amazing Race at the City Hall area. This further strengthened their friendship and class spirit throughout this camp.

In conjunction with Singapore Bicentennial, the Amazing Race included challenges that required students to find out more about the history of Singapore. Some students explored places of interest such as Raffles Landing Site, Cavanagh Bridge, Foundation Stone of Early Founders and Cenotaph for the first time.

The Secondary Two Camp Synergy was conducted from 23rd to 25th of January to help students achieve the following:

- appreciate diversity and work together to foster better understanding of one another;
- develop teamwork and inter-personal skills through exciting and challenging activities;
- develop social awareness; and
- learn and apply the Student Leadership Challenge Model by Kouzes and Posner.

The Secondary Two students revisited the Student Leadership Challenge by Kouzes & Posner and discussed, as a class, what it takes to lead others.

"Level Camp this year was a very fun experience for me. Not only did I get to learn more about my peers, I also gained more confidence in myself. The games set up by the facilitators enabled us to learn about how to become a better leader in a fun and enjoyable way. For the past two years, Level Camps for me have been fun-filled and memorable. Students applied their leadership skills through team building activities such as the Tallest Structure, Crazy Airways, building a Roller Coaster and Team Link. Students also had an immersive experience at the Escape Rooms, solving puzzles and mysteries in groups as they find their way out of the rooms.

The students especially enjoyed the Escape Room experience as it was the first time attempting such an activity for many of them. They displayed teamwork and perseverance during the game. There was good interaction between the teachers and students during the Escape Room experience. All were absorbed in trying to find solutions to the puzzles posed. It was interesting to see even the usually quiet ones become so engaged during the game.

The Secondary Three Camp Resilience was held from 23rd January to 25th January aimed at developing resilience through experiential learning. Chinese Language students enjoyed traditional games, hands-on cultural activities, tea appreciation, martial arts, and the My Story 2019 school tour programmes.

"The Mother Tongue Fortnight was such a meaningful two-week event! We got to explore interesting facts about our own language and culture. School day on Friday 8 March was extraordinary. The School Emergency Evacuation Exercise (Fire Drill) was a massive role play exercise. It was to familiarise all staff and students on the evacuation procedures and the responsibilities of the respective functional groups under the School Emergency Structure (SES). This year, the exercise was co-ordinated with the Police, the SCDF and the community to give the experience added realism.



The scenario was an explosion which occured in the Physics Lab. One teacher and some students acted as the injured. The staff and students were evacuated to the Assembly Area (School Field) and the SCDF and SPF were activated.

The exercise comprised the simulation of injured and affected staff and students, parents and media role players. Observers from other schools were present too. This provided an additional element of reality to the exercise where the School's Emergency Organisation Structure was tested in how well it could respond to the various scenarios.


Teamwork Makes the Dream Work YCKSS Sports Carnival

Our Young Einsteins 20th International Elementz Science Research Conference & Exhibition

The 2019 North Zone Elementz Conference and Exhibition on 8th April was organised by Anderson-Serangoon Junior College. This is an annual platform for students to develop and showcase their aptitude and potential in Science inquiry and problem solving. We were up against notable schools such as Catholic High, St Nicholas Girls' School and School of Science & Technology. A total of six teams from YCKSS participated and all did remarkably well. We clinched one Silver award, two Bronze awards and three Commendations.

YCKSS presented these six research titles:

- 1) The effects of music on the growth of five different seedlings.
- 2) The effects of a DIY cooling system in a classroom.
- 3) Smart Water sensor laundry retractor
- 4) A Smart Humidifier to Reduce Carbon Footprint.
- 5) The relationship between the size of a seed and its ideal planting depth.
- 6) The effectiveness of various music on memory retention.



It was memorable as the students journeyed through with the teacher mentors, improvising their projects along the way. It was a wonderful learning experience as they also got to see the presentation and science research projects put up by other schools.

Two of the teams that researched on plant growth were invited to mount an exhibition booth and present their findings to the community at the Ang Mo Kio community launch of Rooftop Farming on 7th of April. The Guest-of-Honour, Dr Koh Poh Koon was impressed by the passion and the quality of research done by our students.

On 18th April, we celebrated our annual Speech & Prize Presentation Day. It was Yio Chu Kang Secondary School's 54th one. At the same time, it was also a celebration of our very first year together after the merging of two schools. The event was a fantastic opportunity to recognise the growing sense of belonging in our students and staff, celebrating the united efforts as one school and recognising the special achievements of individual staff and students. Many exciting highlights took place around the inspiring theme of Our School, My Story.

Very creatively, staff and students used different mediums to take everyone through four different unique stories of our YCKSians through the sub-themes: Help Each Other Grow; Where Dreams Come True; No one Gets Left Behind; and You Can Be Yourself. These were woven into one fabric through music, videos and drama.

The pre-concert was a static parade that welcomed the Guest-of-Honour, Mrs Edelweis Neo, Superintendent of North Cluster 6, Schools Division in MOE. The concert segment included an NCDCC precision drill which had earlier been presented at the NCDCC National Precision Drill Competition 2019. The movements followed an infectious tempo and displayed the vibrancy, coordination and discipline of the Unit. It was definitely a crowd favourite.



Another great hit amongst the audience was a Drone Flight performance by MARs Club students who amazed everyone with a choreography of multiple Tello EDUs drones maneuvering in the air simultaneously. Using a code to control a swarm of Tello EDUs drone, the MARs Club students had them fly over Mission Pads with acrobatic movements synchronised to music. By improving their programming and fine-tuning their team work, they pushed the limits of their creativity and showed off their skills!

There was a symbolic opening ceremony of Mendel's Garden and the Treemendous Mural by our Guest-of-Honour, Mrs Edelweis Neo. Our student Huang Zi Hang of Secondary 3E3, piloted a drone, transporting a large gold ribbon ball across the back of the school's Performing Arts Theatre to the front of the hall. He skilfully landed the craft on the stage for Mrs Neo to cut the ribbon together with our Principal, Mrs Lim.

Permanent Secretary (Education) Visit





The new Permanent Secretary (Education), Mr Lai Chung Han paid a visit to our school on the 16th of May. The one-and-a-half-hour visit started with a chit-chat session with the N6 Superintendent Mrs Edelweis Neo and our four School Leaders.

Mr Lai was interested to find out more about the recent school merger, the implementation of Subject-based Banding and our partnership with Pathlight School. He was curious about the preparation that the school underwent to bond the Key Personnel, staff and students of both schools. Mrs Lim commented that the merger has been a success and that we have moved beyond this to continue to build on the strength of both the schools. The School Leaders addressed the issue of Subject-based Banding by saying that it was well-received by both parents and students alike. However, there were some challenges that have to be addressed such as timetabling issues and finding suitable venues. Our partnership with Pathlight School has seen students from both schools participate actively in Integration Programmes. In Term 3 students from Pathlight and YCKSS will participate in two new initiatives: English Rocks! and the NTLJ programme. Moreover, they also participated in our Emergency Exercise Rhino.

The chit-chat session was followed by a tour around the school. Mr Lai visited the Mendel's Garden, the School Gym, The Living Room, the Synergy Room and the Heritage Gallery. He also spent some time in an empty classroom to get a sense of the humidity levels in non-air-conditioned rooms. He was genuinely impressed by how YCKSS makes use of space to maximise learning.





To build partnership with parents and to get them on board the holistic educational journey of their children, the school introduced the Have a Chat with the HODs Series. It also gives key personnel a deeper appreciation of the perspective as well as concerns of parents. Between February and May, the following departments: Design & Enterprise, Mother Tongue Languages, English Language, Humanities, and Education & Career Education, shared their curriculum and programmes with the parents.



These four sessions were held on Saturday mornings in school in Term One and Two. Parents were encouraged to sign up for these chats with the HODs. To make it more exciting, external partners such as the Polytechnics and the Institute of Technical Education were also on hand to give meaningful advice. This was followed by a Q&A session for parents to find out more. There was positive feedback from the parents as they were engaged and asked questions proactively. The sessions also gave parents direct access to the Principal Mrs Carol Lim who was present to support each session. Parents thanked the school for organising this which is uniquely YCKSS.
